



Rivers and Wetlands Community Days Application Criteria and Process 2022

I. Introduction

The Rivers & Wetlands Community Days (RWCD) programme is back for 2022, funding practical action by local people to make things better for their rivers and wetlands, now and into the future. Funded by Thames Water, we're looking to support projects big and small, from a couple of practical days with volunteers, through to larger-scale improvement work for rivers and wetlands.

We welcome applications from local, non-Governmental community groups working in the Thames Water catchment, including rivers and wildlife trusts, flood groups, countryside/catchment partnerships, angling clubs and conservation volunteers.

In the 2022 round of funding, we will seek to support a number of:

- Larger-scale projects, each £15K-£20K. These might be, for example, river restoration improving habitat through the introduction of gravel and woody material or a project improving public access to a wetland;
- Smaller-scale projects, each up to £5K. These might include practical demonstration and training days with volunteers or small-scale river and wetland improvement projects.

Successful applicants should aim to complete their project(s) before the end of March 2023 but, in the ongoing circumstances, we will of course be as flexible as possible.

Funding will be provided upfront for smaller-scale projects (up to £5000) and in two tranches for the larger-scale projects: 50% upfront and the remainder to an agreed timetable, proposed in the first instance by applicants in the application form. In both cases, applicants will be expected to act with best endeavour to complete the project and reporting commitment.

A Memorandum of Understanding will be agreed with larger-scale project applicants which, whilst not legally binding, will establish the obligations of the Delivery Panel and the successful applicant. The Delivery Panel includes representatives from the Angling Trust, Environment Agency, Institute of Fisheries Management, Thames Water and Wild Trout Trust.

2. Application Criteria

Successful applicants should aim to deliver the bulk of their work during the 2022 calendar year, with completion (including report submission) before the end of March 2023 but, in the ongoing, peculiar circumstances, we will of course be as flexible as possible. The application window will open on 4/2/22 and close on 4/3/22. We will not consider applications received after the closing date. The Decision Panel will meet in mid-March, with applicants informed by the end of that month.

We are looking for applicants and projects that demonstrate:

- a). that they are within the Thames Water catchment (see Figure I below);
- b). wide and inclusive community benefit. The site(s) for the work must be publicly accessible (e.g. river reaches, lakes or other wetlands) to a broad spectrum of the local community;
- c). a strong element of public engagement. We will prioritise those applicants who aim to involve local communities *practically* in improving rivers, wetlands and their environs;
- d). objectives clearly aimed at improving the ecology of the work site(s), including broader environmental concerns e.g. recycling, biosecurity. Proving the response of biological systems to habitat enhancement can be difficult, costly and time consuming. We do not anticipate funding extensive pre- and post-works monitoring but we do expect some assessment of change as part of the project e.g. through clear objectives and fixed-point photography;
- e). a clear and transparent commitment to complete the proposed project to the best possible standard, with a focus on value for money;
- f). a degree of delivery readiness such as site selection, necessary consents in place at least in principle (e.g. appropriate EA Flood Risk permit, full landowner agreement) and participant groups engaged. This will be essential for both the large and small-scale projects - we will not fund scoping studies or speculative or loosely-formed projects;
- g). a track record of successful delivery of previous, similar work and/or the involvement in the project of an appropriate, expert partner. We will consider inexperienced groups who can demonstrate enthusiasm to be supported towards effective delivery;
- h). unqualified acceptance of full liability for any work undertaken. No liability will be assumed by any member of the Delivery Panel for any aspect of RWCD projects.

3. Publicity & Communications

We encourage you to publicise your project, copying in your PR to Will Barnard at Thames Water (william.barnard@thameswater.co.uk).

If your project is funded, you agree to commit to a post-delivery report, submitted to an agreed deadline, highlighting (amongst other things) benefits to the community, extent of public engagement and habitat change effected; your report will include high quality photographs. You must ensure and confirm that any material included in your report is GDPR compliant. By applying, you confirm that the Delivery Panel are free to use information in your report which might in turn be used in reporting to the funder and in disseminating the successes of the project.
